

Queen's Wharf Brisbane Invigorating our heritage

Queen's Wharf Brisbane is recognised as the birthplace of Brisbane's European history, it has one of the greatest collections of culturally significant heritage buildings and places in Australia, dating back to the early 1800s.

The precinct is situated in the heart of the city's CBD, between the Brisbane River and George Street, and extends from Alice Street to Queen Street.

While many of the buildings, streets, and parks remain, some of the heritage buildings are inaccessible to the general public. As part of Destination Brisbane Consortium's multi-billion dollar Queen's Wharf Brisbane integrated resort development, all of the precinct's heritage buildings and places will be repurposed and reactivated for public use.

By sensitively revitalising these 'jewels' of the precinct, locals and visitors alike will have the unique chance to explore both the Aboriginal and European history of Brisbane through a variety of food and beverage, tourism, and retail experiences, which will breathe new life into a largely underutilised part of the city. New heritage trails through the precinct are also proposed to incorporate both Aboriginal and European history as part of the integrated resort development.

Currently: The Consortium's

project office.

Proposed: Cooking school, and food

and beverage training facility.

(Queensland) headquarters.

Proposed: Mixed food and beverage experiences including a

micro-brewery.

The Commissariat Store Museum and Miller Park

115-127 William Street

Currently: The Royal Historical Society

of Queensland (RHSQ) headquarters; a public park.

Proposed: RHSQ will remain in the

building. Miller Park will be revitalised to provide landscape terraces for access to water; an informal amphitheatre for events and entertainment; and links to the Aboriginal and European

The former State Library Building

Currently: The Star Entertainment

Group's Brisbane office.

Proposed: An Aboriginal and European

Heritage Centre featuring tourist information and interactive exhibits. The National Trust of Australia will also operate from this location.


the development of infrastructure in Brisbane.

2017-2018

Demolition, excavation and shoring works

- Brace heritage buildings as required and install monitoring equipment
- Demolition of non-heritage buildings
- Excavation of integrated resort basement
- Shoring of basement perimeter

2019-2020

Construction

- Commencement of foundation and car park
- Opened Waterline Park and upgraded Bicentennial Bikeway
- Core development starts to take shape as construction progresses above ground
- Neville Bonner Bridge construction commences

2021

- Core of development is continuing to progress skyward
- Fit out of the basement and podium level commences
- Work is commencing on the redevelopment of the section of Bicentennial Bikeway from North Quay to Waterline Park
- Landscaping works on The Landing commence

2022

- Core of development reaches full height on the three hotel towers
- Sky Deck is constructed and lifted into position
- Fit-out of the hotel towers commence
- Neville Bonner Bridge structure installed

2023

- Opening
 Opening of integrated resort development, including hotels, restaurants
- and public realm areasNeville Bonner Bridge completed and opened
- T Galleria at the Printery heritage building opened
- Queen's Wharf Residences completed
- Bicentennial bikeway upgrade works completed

2024

 Transformation and staged opening of various heritage buildings throughout the precinct
